"Meeting with career coach Mallory and utilizing the Career Center must be one of the greatest decisions I made during my undergraduate education. Mallory directed me to application portals, coached me through application processes, created a space to practice and refine my interviewing skills, guided me as I explored my career interests, supported me as I applied to graduate schools, and provided me with feedback no matter how niche my question might have been. With Mallory's help, I became an undergraduate research assistant, then a member of Iowa's department of human rights Youth Action Squad, then a member of the University Counseling Service Student Advisory Board member, and finally a graduate student. In May of 2023, I graduated with an undergraduate degree in psychology.

When I needed a mentor most, Mallory assumed that mentor role.

Today, I am preparing for my second year as a graduate student here at the University of Iowa enrolled in the Clinical Mental Health Counseling M.A. program. Utilizing the services provided by the career center taught me so much about pursuing my own career, and how to better support others as they grow as professionals and individuals."

Academic courses in career-related topics, such as career exploration and job search skills, are available each semester for academic credit ranging from 1-3 s.h. per course.



Undergraduate research, community engagement, study abroad and field experiences like internships, practicums, and co-ops enrich students educational experiences, and are essential for students post-graduation success. High cost of living and/or lack of pay with many of these opportunities can be barriers to student participation, especially for students who are struggling financially.

The Hawkeye Experience Grant reduces the financial barrier to participation. In Summer 2023, through approximately \$54,000 in funds from the UI Strategic Initiative Fund and Collins Aerospace, 28 students were supported in their research, internships, and study abroad.

Funds supported experiences at Harvard, Mayo Clinic Health Systems, and NASA; sites close to Iowa City at local non-profits, UI, and UIHC; and globally with Office of Study Abroad internship sites in Europe, Africa, South America, and Oceana. Award offers were in variable amounts up to \$4,000 with the average amount being \$2,105.

Yaj had received research funding to do some work on a NASA funded project under a UI professor during Spring semester, but he was unable to increase his involvement by doing an internship at NASA during the summer unless he found outside funding as required by NASA.

Giving back to his fellow students as a resident assistant restricted his time and he did not think he would make enough money between being a resident assistant and a research assistant. With the Hawkeye Experience Grant, he was able to be on site in Houston networking with NASA professionals and interns from across the United States while working on aerospace projects.



During her time at the University of Iowa, she was often working at least two jobs to support her living and educational costs. She thought study abroad was too expensive to be able to participate, but with funding from the Hawkeye Experience Grant and 5 other scholarships, she was able to spend her summer gaining exposure to a new culture and language, supporting the health and emotional needs of HIV/ AIDS patients, gaining an understanding of maternal health and the complications associated with pregnancy that contribute to maternal mortality, and learning about the Kenyan healthcare system.




